While we have made progress, there is still much work to do, including how we provide support to project partners on their own JEDI journeys, how we ensure our board and team are continuously learning in this area, and our ongoing efforts to revise policies and documents to reflect our commitment to equity. We could not have made the strides we did without their dedication, time, and vulnerability.

I also want to thank all of you for your support of CNDC and our project partners. Your support fuels the critical work of our projects and enables their positive impacts on Colorado communities.

## CNDC'S SUPPORT OF PROJECTS AND THE COMMUNITY

### **PROJECT SUPPORT**

# COVID continued to impact projects in 2021 and 2022, and CNDC continued its efforts to provide additional support to projects. Below are highlights.


- Funding CNDC secured a second round of more than \$1 million in PPP loan funds for projects. CNDC did all the work to apply, administer the funds, and apply for forgiveness. As one project director said, "PPP funding was even more important in 2021 as emergency foundation funding went away and we still were unable to ramp up our programming. We would not have survived without the second round of PPP from CNDC."
- **Relaunch Programming** Worked with project leaders to plan for relaunching in-person programming and services and ensure that safety policies and protocols were in place.
- Relief Payments Emergency payments to individuals provided essential support in 2021 and 2022. For example, Bank On Denver provided \$300,000+ payments to 77 Denver residents to avoid default /foreclosure. CNDC's back office capacity meant these emergency payments could be made very quickly.

### HOME FOR CRISIS RESPONSE INITIATIVES

When there is a crisis, new efforts need to quickly launch to support Colorado communities. CNDC is uniquely qualified to manage those efforts. Here are two examples:

- Denver Food Emergency Relief Fund (NPERF) and Denver Food Security Fund (DSFS) – Partnering with the City of Denver, CNDC was the grant administrator for \$3+ million in ARPA grants to reduce food insecurity in Denver and build the capacity of food banks and pantries. Grants awarded to 80+ nonprofits. Most grantees received funds within a week of being awarded.
- Marshall Fire Family Relief Fund A project dedicated to helping victims of the Marshall Fire. Funds were raised by local leaders to bridge the financial gap between the fire and when government aid and insurance payments would begin. Over \$1.2 million was given in small grants to individuals and families in need. Grants were paid within two days of approval.
